
Eulo camp by the **Paroo River.** We've been here before in 2017. A nice spot to hang out for a few days:





Only a short distance from the main road we find the bird sanctuary **Eulo Lagoon.** At this location there are plenty of camp sites to choose from as well!













And some others still inhabit the fields to this day...














Nothing like a piece of Vegemite toast in the morning with your cuppa!



Ever wondered what the Outback night sky looks like?




